

The Law says that parents of children aged between 5-16, who are on a school roll, must make sure that their child goes to school both regularly and punctually. This means that children are in school when they should be and that they arrive at school in time for both morning and afternoon sessions.

A child continues to be of compulsory school age until the last Friday in June in the school year that they reach the age of 16.

If a child who is registered at a school fails to attend regularly and there are no legitimate reasons, then parents are guilty of an offence under section 444 of the Education Act 1996 even if they are missing school without your knowledge.

If convicted, parents will be liable to a fine of up to £2500/and or a prison sentence of up to 3 months. Magistrates may also impose a Parenting Order.

Should parents fail to do this, then information may be placed before the Magistrates and, if convicted, they could be issued with a Parenting Order, fined up to a maximum of £2500 and/or receive 12 weeks imprisonment.

In cases where parents/carers have not ensured their child/children's regular attendance at school, or may not have co-operated with school and/or the Education Welfare Service it may be decided to place them on 'Fast Track'.

Parents/carers who are placed on 'Fast Track' to prosecution will:

- Receive a Legal Advice Notice including an invitation to an Attendance Meeting.
- Be expected to attend a meeting at school where attendance issues will be discussed, and a contract may be signed. Failure to attend the meeting will not avoid the Fast Track process
- Have 6 weeks in which to ensure their childs attendance is 95% - school average, or at least 90% which the Persistent Absence Threshold.
- Be written to at the 6-week review to inform you of the progress and outcome

If attendance is not maintained during the time period, the matter may be brought to the attention of the Court. If 90-95% is achieved, your child/children's attendance will be closely monitored until attendance is no longer a concern.
