<p>Key Facts</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Advent is a time of expectation as we wait for the arrival of Jesus at Christmas. • Our expectations can shape that way that we act. • The prophets, such as Isaiah, in the Old Testament talk about the coming of the Messiah and invite us to be joyful. These scriptures reassure us and give us a sense of joy and excitement • John begins his Gospel with the prophecy of the Messiah: He uses the phrase 'The Word became flesh and dwelt amongst us' – through this phrase John reassures us that what the prophets have said is true and that Jesus is the Messiah. • Advent is also a time when we are reminded that Jesus will come again. Throughout advent, we consider how we can live our lives to be more like Jesus, so we will always be ready.

Expectation	a strong belief that something will happen or be the case.

Advent	the first season of the Church year, leading up to Christmas and including the four preceding Sundays.
Christmas	the annual Christian festival celebrating Christ's birth, held on 25 December in the Western Church.
Emmanuel	A Biblical word, which means 'God is with us'. It is often a word used to refer to Jesus.
Annunciation	A term used to describe the event when Angel Gabriel announces to Mary she will have God's son.
The Angelus	a Roman Catholic devotion commemorating the Incarnation of Jesus and including the Hail Mary, said at morning, noon, and sunset.
Incarnation	the embodiment of God the Son in human flesh as Jesus Christ.
